

n Friday evening, November 17, 1911, three Howard University undergraduate students, with the assistance of their faculty adviser, gave birth to the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity. This event occurred in the office of biology Professor Ernest E. Just, the faculty adviser. His office was in the Science Hall (now known as Thirkield Hall). The three liberal arts students were Edgar A. Love, Oscar J. Cooper and Frank Coleman. From the initials of the Greek phrase meaning "friendship is essential to the soul," the name Omega Psi Phi was derived. The phrase was selected as the motto. Manhood, scholarship, perseverance and uplift were adopted as cardinal principles. A decision was made regarding the design for the pin and emblem, and thus ended the first meeting of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

The next meeting was conducted on November 23, 1911. Edgar Love became the first Grand Basileus (National President). Cooper and Coleman were selected Grandkeeper of the Records (National Secretary) and Grandkeeper of Seals (National Treasurer), respectively. Eleven Howard University undergraduate men were selected as charter members.

Alpha Chapter was organized with fourteen charter members on December 15, 1911. Love, Cooper and Coleman were elected the chapter's first Basileus, Keeper of Records, and Keeper of Seals, respectively. On March 8, 1912, the fraternity's constitution, which had been previously submitted to the Howard University Faculty Council, was rejected (by that body). The Faculty Council proposed to accept the fraternity as a local but not a national organization. The fraternity refused acceptance as a strictly local organization.


Oscar Cooper became the fraternity's second Grand Basileus in 1912. Cooper authorized the investigation of a proposed second chapter at Lincoln University (Pennsylvania). Edgar Love was elected as the third Grand Basileus in 1912 and served until 1915. In 1914, Howard University withdrew its opposition, and the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity was incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia on October 28, 1914. Beta Chapter, at Lincoln University, was chartered in February 1914. George E. Hall, the fourth Grand Basileus, had been initiated at Alpha Chapter in 1914. Grand Basileus Hall authorized the establishment of Gamma Chapter in Boston, Massachusetts.

However, the chapter was eventually established during the administration of the fifth Grand Basileus, James C. McMorries. During the administration of the sixth Grand Basileus, Clarence F. Holmes, the fraternity's first official hymn, "Omega Men Draw Nigh", was written by Otto Bohannon. Raymond G. Robinson, the seventh Grand Basileus, established Delta Chapter in Nashville, Tennessee in 1919. Robinson left office in 1920, with a total of ten chapters in operation. Stanley Douglas served as Editor of the The Oracle, the official organ of the fraternity. It was first published in the spring of 1919. Harold K. Thomas, the eighth Grand Basileus, was elected at the 1920 Nashville Grand Conclave. At this Conclave, Carter G. Woodson inspired the establishment of National Achievement Week, to promote the study of Negro life and history. The 1921 Atlanta Grand Conclave brought to an end the first decade of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.





Dr. Oscar J. Cooper (1888-1972)

Oscar J. Cooper was born in Washington, D.C.

He graduated from the M Street High School, Washington, D.C.

He received the B. S. degree from Howard University in 1913 and the Doctor of Medicine degree from Howard University in 1917.

For 50 years, he practiced medicine in Philadelphia, PA. Prof. Frank Coleman (1890-1967)

Frank Coleman was born in Washington, D.C.

He graduated from the M Street High School in Washington, D.C.

He received the B.S. degree from Howard University in 1913 and the M. S. degree from the University of Chicago.

Coleman undertook advanced training at the University of Pennsylvania

He later became Professor and head of the Physics Dept. at Howard University.

He was a U.S. Army officer in World War I. BIS. EDGAR A. LOVE (1891-1974)

Edgar A. Love was born in Harrisburg. Virginia. He graduated H.S. from the Academy of Morgan College.

He received the B.S. degree from Howard University in 1913 and the Bachelor of Divinity Degree from Howard University in 1916.

He also received the Bachelor of Sacred Theology degree from Boston University in 1918, and the Doctor of Divinity Degree (Honorary) from Morgan College in 1935.

Love was a U.S. Army Chaplain in WW I and a Bishop in the Methodist Church. Dr. Ernest E. Just (1883-1941)



NATIONAL PROGRAMS





ACHIEVEMENT WEEK - Originally designed to promote the study of Negro life and history, today, Achievement Week is used to seek out and give due recognition to those individuals at the local and national level who have made a noteworthy contribution toward improving the quality of life for African Americans (see also National High School Essay Contest).

NATIONAL SOCIAL ACTION PROGRAM - A national committee coordinates the multifaceted program

of the various chapters. Most chapters are involved in voter registration, "getting-out-the-vote'," support of the NAACP, support of the National Urban League and support of hundreds of other organizations or programs.

TALENT HUNT PROGRAM - This program originated in the Sixth District (North Carolina and South Carolina), with its debut occurring at the 1953 Cincinnati Grand Conclave. The Talent Hunt Program provides exposure, encouragement and financial assistance to talented young people, based on their participation in the performing arts. Currently, some participants at the national level are awarded college scholarships.

MEMORIAL SERVICE - March 12 of each year has been established as Memorial Day. Chapters are expected to conduct an appropriate service, to recall the memory of those members who have entered Omega Chapter.

RECLAMATION - Though this program, concerted effort at the national, district, and local levels is made to return inactive brothers to full participatory status.

NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL ESSAY CONTEST - This is a phase of the National Achievement Week observance held in November of each year. The contest is open to all college-bound high school seniors. College scholarships are awarded to the winners, each of whom must submit an essay on a theme/topic, which is chosen annually by the fraternity.



SOCIAL ACTION - The Social Action Committee is intricately involved with the coordination of many of Omega's mandated programs and hundreds of other programs that local chapters implement. The Social Action Committee

has implemented a program that helps individuals from different age groups manage money. The Social Action committee also plays a major role in coordinating the America Diabetes Walk-a-thon, in which chapters form teams to raise money for the American Diabetes Association. HEALTH CARE INITIATIVES - The Health Care Initiatives of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., inform the surrounding communities about health conditions and diseases that directly affect African Americans. Large efforts have been made in the area of Prevention of Prostate Cancer and the diagnosis and treatment of Hypertension and Diabetes. Omega has joined with other black fraternities in a collaborative effort to reduce the disparity of minority admissions to Medical and Dental School. This effort is also joined by the National Medical Association, the National Dental Association and the Centers for Disease Control.

POST-SECONDARY SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM
The Scholarship Program is intended to promote academic excellence among the undergraduate members. Graduate chapters are expected to provide financial assistance to student members and non-members. A portion of the fraternity's national budget is allocated to the Scholarship Fund now called the Charles R. Drew Memorial Scholarship Fund.

HIGH SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM - Omega Psi Phi awards college scholarships through its 750 local chapters spread throughout this country and in other parts of the world. Some chapters even offer scholarships through separate 501(c)3 entities that support full scholarships for graduating high school seniors. Students often call the International Headquarters for scholarship opportunities, because Omega Psi Phi is listed in publications as an organization that awards scholarships. These calls are redirected to the local chapters in the students' community. Scholarships can range from book assistance (\$300-\$500) to full tuition costs. The International Headquarters only awards scholarships to the winners of the National High School Essay Contest.
